Cook's Corner

Perfect Apple Dumplings

Sauce

2 c sugar

2 c water

¼ tsp each cinnamon and nutmeg

¼ c butter.

Combine sugar, spices and water and cook for 5 minutes.

Add butter and remove from heat.

Pare and core 6 apples

Crust

2 c flour

1 tsp salt



2 tsp baking powder % c shortening % c milk

Combine flour, salt, baking powder and cut in shortening as for pastry. Add milk all at once. Stir just until flour is moistened. Turn out on floured surface and roll ¼" thick. Cut into six 5" squares. Place one apple on each square, sprinkle with additional sugar and spices. Dot each with additional butter. Fold corners to cover apple. Pinch edges together. Place 1" apart in a greased pan. Pour sauce over dumplings. Bake at 375° for 35 minutes. Serve hot with cream.

A Poor Man's Posi traction

Every once in a while I disassemble a Model A rear axle assembly and find that someone has welded the three spider gears in the differential to their axle shafts so that they do not rotate. I envision some 17 year old kid with a duck-tail haircut back in 1950 doing this. In the day this was called a poor man's Posi traction. By welding the spider gears so that they do not rotate, there is essentially no differential gearing in the rear axle assembly. This allows Mr. Ducktail to take off from a signal and lay down a strip of rubber equally from both back wheels. The differential gearing in a rear axle assembly was developed by some ingenious mind. It allows a car to turn a corner with each rear wheel turning at a different rotation. The outboard wheel is turning faster than the inboard wheel. This allows the car to make a turn in either direction in a smooth continuous manner. Mr. Ducktail when making a turn would have his out board wheel skipping and making a chirping sound as the rubber tire skidded around the turn.

It is interesting to note that the rear axle assembly that the spider gear assembly came out of in the photo below also had a tooth missing from the ring gear.

Working with Jack Stands

We frequently put our vehicles up on jack stands, to change the oil, grease the chassis, or adjust the brakes. I have a hard time seeing under the car, to see if I have the two jack stands on an axle set to the same height. I sometimes end up with the car leaning to one side or the other when I get one jack stand set to a different height from the other.

Here's what I've done to help my poor eyes: Use a paint pen and number every other ratchet tooth on each jack stand, so that you can quickly set the pair on an axle to the same height.



Holly has a nice collection of these paint pens in her craft stuff, so I borrowed a white one for a few minutes and added some numbers to the teeth. As you can see, the contrast of the white paint makes them easy to read from a distance. I now quickly get them set where I want them.



We are all looking forward to cooler touring!




Men Working

How does the Model A man dress when he isn't a suit and tie or overall wearin' kinda guy? There are plenty of choices to give your Model A excursion an era feel. A modern, long-sleeved button up dress shirt is a good start. Referencing the Fashion Guidelines look for solid colors, striped or figured designs in harmonizing or contrasting colors. Long sleeved button up shirts made of cotton, flannel, wool, or blends of these fabrics are common. A flannel shirt in plaid or solid colors would fit in perfectly. OverAttired Vintage Fashion carries a variety of vintage clothing and are always adding to their inventory.

As you begin, a modern pair of trousers with or without cuffs, flat front, or a single pleat with belt loops would be appropriate. Look for a trouser with wide legs and a high waist. The most difficult to recreate is the button fly on a pair trousers. There are patterns available to make your own or see if a

local tailor is willing to take the pattern and make you a pair. <u>Simon James Cathcart - SJC - (simonjamescathcart.com)</u>, is a high-quality modern brand making era appropriate men's clothing.



herringbone and plain. The Fashion Guidelines also list a variety of specialty caps including mechanics caps. The familiar blue striped engineer cap was also worn by mechanics.

To add to your look, a sleeveless or long-sleeved, V-neck sweater could be worn. A shawl collar long sleeve pull-over or button up sweater could be added. Bozeman Vintage carries a variety of vintage menswear for everyday dress. Hunting and outdoor jackets made of khaki or duck are very similar to what you can find today from Carhartt, Cabela's and other sporting goods stores. Long underwear or union suits are in all the era magazines, usually wool, cotton or a mix. Cotton union suits in red or white are still easy to get from a variety of stores like Tractor Supply, Vermont Old Country Store and Hanes.

Lucky for you, men's era shoes have not changed much from those you can find in modern stores. Low top, high top, cap toe and plain toed shoes and boots were available. Square and round toe shoes were seen in all four years of the A era. Cowboy boots and hunting or hiking boots are also options you can look into. These shoes and boots would have been leather with leather soles, with some having rubber heels Leggings and puttees could be worn for a hunting or hiking look. These could be leather, wool or canvas and would provide warmth and protection for the lower leg.

Take a look in your closet or at your local second-hand store. You may find a suitable outfit for your next ride in the Model A I hope this helps you put together an easy and comfortable outfit.
